

Presented By Steve Charing and Bob Ford at the September 12, 2025 Club Meeting

A summarized version of the presentation is included below. The full presentation <u>can be</u> accessed through this link.

This month marks our club's 55th anniversary. Here are some of the club's key milestones:

- The first meeting was held September 15, 1970, in Towson, organized by Dan W. McAdams. The club started as Baltimore Bottle Hounds with a small group of collectors.
- Bylaws were added in 1973, and meetings began taking place regularly on the second Friday each month.
- Membership grew steadily, leading to the club's name change to Baltimore Antique Bottle Hounds, reaching 52 members by the end of the '70s.
- In September 1980, a successful exhibit inspired the launch of annual bottle shows. The first show happened March 8, 1981, at the Ramada Inn.
- Our name became Baltimore Antique Bottle Club in February 1982; bylaws were updated accordingly.
- Shows expanded, attracting hundreds of attendees and growing membership to 150 by 1984.
- Notable initiatives included tracking local bottles (published as the Baltimore Bottle Book in 1998) and bus trips to other clubs' shows.
- Venue changes occurred over the years: from schools to hotels, then to Essex Community College for 25 years, and lately to Howard County Fairgrounds.
- The club's newsletter evolved, and holiday parties, picnics, contests, and educational programs became regular features.
- A Distinguished Service Award was created in 1999 to honor dedicated members.
- The club launched its website in 2003, which later won the Federation of Historical Bottle Collectors' Best Website award in 2013.

Recent Milestones (2000–2025):

- The club faced challenges like the events of September 11, 2001, and the COVID-19 pandemic, adapting with venue and schedule changes.
- Despite setbacks, including the cancellation of the 2021 show, the club continued to hold wellattended events and publish new editions of the Baltimore Bottle Book.
- The 25th show in 2005 was commemorated by the county executive, and a club table was dedicated to Ferd Meyer in 2006.
- Our website became essential for promotion and communication.
- Outings to historical sites remained popular, and the club maintained an excellent reputation among bottle collecting organizations.

In summary, BABC's history is marked by adaptability, growth, and ongoing commitment to its members and the hobby.

This interest led him to embark on a quest to collect Hutchinson sodas from all 50 states, a goal he completed about three years ago. His collection also includes other colored bottles in various shapes, such as ponies, squats, torpedoes, and gravitaters.





HISTORICAL EVENTS IN OCTOBER BY DAY (http://holidayinsights.com/history)

- 1: John Philip Sousa becomes the Director of the US Marine Corps Band. (1880) | The first issue of National Geographic hits the newsstand. (1888) | Yosemite National Park was established. (1890) | The Television series "The Twilight Zone" premiered. (1959) | Walt Disney World opens in Orlando, Florida. (1971)
- 2: Peanuts comic strip by Charles Schultz first appears in newspapers. (1950)

- **21:** "Old Ironsides", the USS Constitution was launched in Boston, MA. (1797) | Thomas Edison invented the incandescent electric lamp. (1879)
- **22:** Polish born Karol Józef Wojtyła becomes Pope John Paul II. He is the first non-Italian to become pope in 455 years. (1978)
- 23: 25,000 women march in New York City demanding the right to vote.(1915)
- **24:** Anna Edison Taylor is the first person to survive going over Niagara Falls in a barrel. (1901) | Black Thursday stock market panic.
