# BOTTLE BRAIN

## Question:

I am a new collector. What are some of the basic things a beginner like me should learn?

## Answer:

- ❑ **Buy the best bottle you can afford.** In the long run you will be better off buying one rare \$100 bottle than 20 common \$5 bottles. Also, buy bottles in the best condition as possible. The rarer, more expensive bottles will continue to appreciate in price as opposed to the common bottles that have stayed the same price for years and are harder to sell when the time comes. Familiarize yourself as to how bottles are valued. Supply and demand are the main factors. Others include rarity, age, color, condition, type, embossment and regional interest.
- ❑ **Learn the basic bottle shapes.** With a little patience you should be able to place most bottles into a category, such as beer, whiskey, food, soda, barber, fruit jar, figural, milk, poison, ink, bitters, etc.
- ❑ **Learn how to determine the age of a bottle by examining its lip and base.** If the seam goes over the lip, the bottle was made after 1906 by a device called an automatic bottle machine (ABM). The further down the seam is from the lip the older it is in most cases. Also, the base is very important. A jagged pontil mark, also called an open pontil (OP), usually dates the bottle before the end of the 1850's. An iron pontil (IP) dates the bottle from 1855-1865 or so. With the invention of the snap case to hold bottles during the lip application process, most bottles after 1865 have smooth bases.
- ❑ **Specialize.** Narrow your collecting interest to an area you like best, and publicize your interest as widely as possible. If you develop the reputation of being a Beer Baron, Milk Maven, Whiskey Wizard or Figural Freak, good bottles in those categories will be offered to you first. Also, select a category you can afford and is not so narrow that you can only find one bottle for your collection every two years, resulting in a loss of interest.
- ❑ **Educate yourself.** Subscribe to bottle magazines; and read every bottle book you can buy or loan. Take advantage of your local bottle club (of course, one of the best of all is the Baltimore Antique Bottle Club (BABC). Ask questions of your fellow members—many have years of expertise.
- ❑ **Attend bottle shows.** They are a great place to learn. Most dealers are happy to answer questions from new collectors, especially during the later hours of a show when things quiet down. Don't be afraid to ask, "What is the best you can do on this bottle?" Most dealers will offer at least 10 percent off the sticker prices. Many dealers are receptive to a counteroffer. If they turn you down, thank them anyway and move on.

# BOTTLE BRAIN (continued)

☐ **Surf the Net!** The internet has a wealth of information; take advantage of it. A great site is eBay (ebay.com), which conducts buying and selling of all categories of bottles through auctions. There you can see what an individual bottle has sold for in the past and will help you learn about the values of bottles. However, beware of the temptation to overbid. The Federation of Historical Bottle Collectors (fohbc.org) provides a



wealth of information, our club's website (baltimorebottleclub.org) is also informative, and there are many others. There are also numerous Facebook pages and groups springing up that zero in on specific bottle categories where you view many pictures and can acquire a lot of knowledge as well as chat with other collectors. In addition, there are online bottle auction houses/sites, such as Glassworks Auctions, American Glass Gallery, Heckler Auctions, among others.

☐ **Buying pitfalls.** Over the years a large number of reproduction bottles (repros) have been made. With experience you will be able to pick out most repros, but even the experts can be fooled sometimes. Color enhancement and irradiating bottles to change their colors, plus being aware of repairs with acrylic resins are also what bottle buyers need to watch out for.

☐ **Catalog your collection.** Write down information about your bottles when you buy them or use a spreadsheet to keep track. This will help with insurance and future collection sale plus cuts down on duplication.

☐ **Have fun.** As in the case of with most hobbies in bottle collecting, you will get out of it what you put into it. Having fun, meeting friendly people and learning new things are the best reasons to get started in this fascinating and educational hobby.

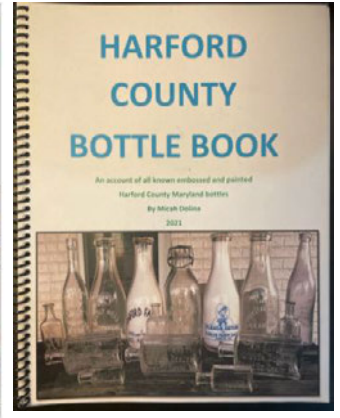
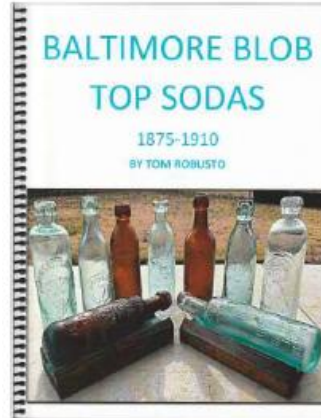

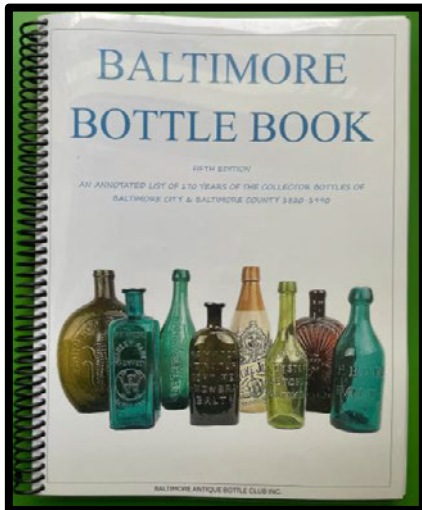

# THINK THEME BOTTLES – THIS DAY IN HISTORY

HISTORICAL EVENTS IN MARCH BY DAY (<http://holidayinsights.com/history>)

**April 1** Oliver Pollack invents the dollar sign \$. (1778) Dexter Mason Ferry and partners found Gardener, Ferry & Church Seed Company, now called Ferry-Morse, the oldest seed company in America. (1856) Daytime soap opera General Hospital first airs on ABC. (1963) Steve Jobs and Steve Wozniak found Apple computer from the garage of Job's parents' home in Cupertino, CA. (1976) Google introduces Gmail. (2004)

**April 2** Explorer Juan Ponce DeLeon, claims Florida for Spain. (1513) Congress passes the Coinage Act and the U.S. Mint is born. (1792) William Magear "Boss" Tweed, a corrupt NYC politician, U.S. Senator, and NY State Senator. (1823) The first Easter Egg Roll is held on the White House Lawn. (1877) The television drama series "Dallas" premieres. (1978)

**April 3** The Pony Express begins delivering the mail. (1860) American outlaw Jesse James is killed by Robert Ford in his home in St. Joseph. (1882) The movie "Planet of the Apes" premieres at theaters across America. (1968)

**April 4** Susanna Medora Salter is the first woman elected mayor in the nation in Argonia, Kansas. (1887) Martin Luther King Jr. is assassinated. (1968) The original twelve countries sign the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) into existence. (1949) In New York City, the World Trade Tower opens. At 110 stories, it is the tallest building in the world at the time. (1973) Bill Gates and Paul Allen create Microsoft. (1975)

**April 5** Saint Patrick returns to Ireland as a missionary Bishop. (456) General Douglas MacArthur died in Washington, D.C. at the age of 84. (1964)

**April 6** The first modern Olympic games open in Athens, Greece. (1896) Explorers Matthew A. Henson and Robert E. Perry are the first to reach the North Pole. (1909) Twinkies hit the market. The first Twinkies were banana-filled. (1930) Roy J. Plunkett invents Teflon. (1938)

**April 7** The United Nations creates the World Health Organization (WHO). (1948) The musical South Pacific, by Rodgers and Hammerstein, opens on Broadway. (1949) The Internet's symbolic birthday. (1969)

**April 8** Researchers discover the ancient Greek Statue Vincent di Milo on the Aegean Island of Milos. (1820) Bottlers put milk in glass bottles for the first time. (1879) Hank Aaron of the Atlanta Braves hits his 715th home run to surpass Babe Ruth's 714 home run record. (1974)

**April 9** Confederate General Robert E. Lee surrenders to Ulysses S. Grant at Appomattox Courthouse, ending the Civil War. (1865) Bob Hope's first appearance on television. (1950) French explorer LaSalle reaches the Mississippi River. (1691) The U.S. Senate passes a law making Winston Churchill the first honorary U.S. citizen. (1963)

**April 10** Walter Hunt of New York City patents the safety pin. He later sells the patent for \$400. See Safety Pin Day. (1849) Do you love animals? The American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals established. (1866) The "unsinkable" RMS Titanic departs on its maiden (and final) voyage from Southampton, England. (1912) Golfers create the PGA and hold the first professional golf tournament. (1916) Paul McCartney officially announces that the Beatles have split up. (1970)

# HISTORICAL EVENTS IN MARCH BY DAY (continued)

**April 11** The U.S. Submarine Force is officially established. (1900) President Lyndon B. Johnson signs the Civil Rights Act of 1968. (1968) Apple's Steve Wozniak creates the Apple 1 computer. (1976) Archeologists discover fossilized dinosaur eggs with embryos in China. (2003)

**April 12** The Civil War begins when Confederate troops opened fire on the Union garrison at Fort Sumter, SC. 40,000 shells were fired before the Union troops surrendered. No one was killed. (1862) By an Act of Congress, Puerto Rico becomes a U.S., territory. (1900) Mount Washington Observatory records the highest surface wind ever measured, anywhere on earth— 231 miles per hour! See Big Wind Day. (1934) Russian Cosmonaut Yuri Gagarin becomes the first person in space. (1961)

**April 13** After 34 hours of bombardment, Fort Sumter surrenders to the Confederates during the Civil War. (1861) Tiger Woods wins the Masters Golf Tournament, becoming the first African American and youngest person to win this premier golf event. (1997)

**April 14** Noah Webster produced the first American Dictionary. (1828) President Abraham Lincoln is shot by John Wilkes Booth at Ford's Theater in Washington, D.C. He died the next day. (1865) Author John Steinbeck publishes his novel "The Grapes of Wrath". (1939)

**April 15** The Titanic hits an iceberg in the Northern Atlantic Ocean and sinks. (1912) The first franchised McDonald's restaurant opens in Des Plaines, IL. (1955) The U.S. Food and Drug Administration approves the use of Botox. (2002) A major fire at Notre Dame Cathedral in Paris, topples the spire, destroys the roof, and more. (2019)

**April 16** The U.S. Postal Service issues the first books of postage stamps. (1900) The battle of Berlin begins as Russian forces begin to attack the Nazi capital. (1945) Walter Cronkite begins as anchor of CBS Evening News. (1962)

**April 17** Geoffrey Chaucer tells "The Canterbury Tales" for the first time at the court of English King Richard II. (1397) The Ford Mustang is formally introduced to the marketplace. The base price: \$2,368. (1964)

**April 18** Paul Revere makes his famous ride from Charlestown to Lexington, Ma., shouting "the Red Coats are coming" as the American Revolutionary War begins. (1775) Fighting ended for the American Revolution, exactly 8 years to the day when it first started. (1783) The Great San Francisco earthquake hits, killing almost 4,000 people and destroying over 75% of the city. (1906) A group of jugglers creates the International Juggler's Association (IJA). (1947) See World Juggler's Day The longest game in professional baseball history: Pawtucket Red Sox tie the Rochester Red Wings 2-2 in 32 innings. The game was finished on June 23, Pawtucket won 3-2 in 33 innings. (1981)

**April 19** The Battle of Lexington and Concord. British troops fire "the shot heard 'round the world" and the Revolutionary War begins. (1775) President Herbert Hoover suggests a five-day work week. (1932) After a 51-day siege in Waco, Texas, the Branch Davidian compound goes up in flames, killing the cult members. (1993) Timothy McVeigh bombs the Federal Building in Oklahoma City, killing 168 people, and injuring hundreds more. (1995)

**April 20** The first known performance of Shakespeare's tragedy "Macbeth" is performed at Globe Theatre in London, England. (1611) The final episode of the television series "Soap" airs. (1981) Two teenage boys go on a shooting rampage in Columbine High School in Littleton, Colorado. One teacher and 12 students are killed. (1999)

**April 21** The city of Rome, Italy was founded. (753 B.C.) First Lady Lucy Hayes begins the tradition of holding an egg rolling contest on the White House lawn. (1878) The Spanish-American War begins. (1898) German WWI Air Ace Baron Manfred von Richtofen, "The Red Baron", is shot down and killed over Vaux sur Somme, France. (1918) Secretaries Day, now called "Administrative Professionals Day", is first celebrated. (1952) Elvis Presley's first hit record, "Heartbreak Hotel", reaches #1 on the charts. (1956)

**April 22** The first human eye transplant is performed. (1969) The First Earth Day celebration is held, founded by Gaylord Nelson. (1970) Barbara Walters becomes the first female U.S. nightly news anchor (for ABC). (1976)

**April 23** Robert E. Lee is named the Commander of the Virginia Confederate forces. (1861) Hammerin' Hank Aaron hits the first of his 755 home runs. (1954)

**April 24** Greek forces enter Troy by using a Trojan Horse. (1184 B.C.) Eastman Kodak Company is founded by George Eastman. (1888) Mr. and Mrs. Jacob Murdock are the first to travel across the U.S. in a car. They drove their Packard from LA to NYC in 32 days 5 hours and 25 minutes. (1908)

**April 25** Ground is broken for the Suez Canal. (1859) New York becomes the first state to require automobile license plates. The fee: \$1.00. (1901) Delegates from 45 countries meet in San Francisco to organize the United Nations. (1945) The American Bowling Congress approves the use of automated pinsetters. (1952)

**April 26** Copernicus makes his first observations of Saturn. (1514) The world's worst nuclear power plant accident occurs in Chernobyl, Russia when reactor #4 explodes. (1986)

**April 27** The cornerstone is laid for the new Palace of Westminster. (1840) Senior citizens take note, the first Social Security checks were distributed. (1937)

**April 28** Mutiny on the HMS Bounty, the most famous naval mutiny in world history. (1789) Muhammad Ali refuses to be inducted into the army and is stripped of his world heavyweight title. (1967) Iran opposes the sale of "Satanic Verses" by Salman Rushdie. (1989)

**April 29** Elias Howe applies for a patent for the "Continuous Clothing Closure", later called the Zipper. See National Zipper Day. (1851) The first edition of Peter Roget's Thesaurus is published. (1852) U.S. forces begin withdrawal of its citizens from South Vietnam. (1975) The world record longest sausage is made in Kitchener, Ontario, Canada. It is 28.77 miles long! (1995)

**April 30** George Washington is inaugurated as the first president of the United States. (1789) The Louisiana Purchase is completed in Paris, France. The price tag: \$15M, about 4 cents per acre. (1803) Warner Brother's "Bugs Bunny" debuts. (1936) The ice cream cone makes its debut at the St. Louis World's Fair. (1904) Adolph Hitler commits suicide along with his new wife Eva Braun in his bunker in Berlin. (1945) Mr. Potato Head is marketed for the first time. (1952) The Vietnam War ends with the fall of Saigon (later renamed Ho Chi Minh City). (1975)
