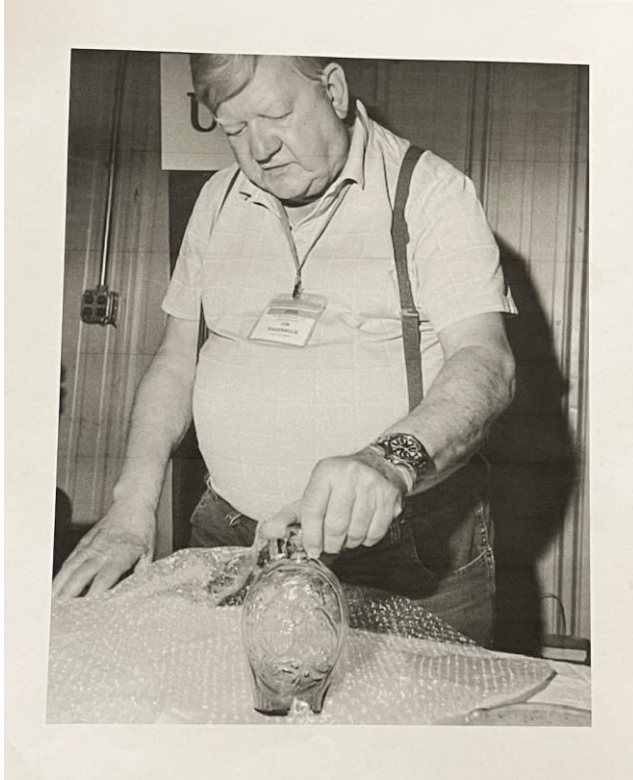

# EARLY BALTIMORE BEERS & SODAS

Very few examples of open-pontiled, Baltimore beer and soda bottles exist before 1845. You might find some in the inner harbor where construction dirt and dredging debris were often dumped.



A rare J.Holmes stoneware soda bottle circa 1809.



An aqua glass, torpedo mineral water bottle from John Lee Chapman, a London pharmacist, is probably one of the first Baltimore sodas. This particular bottle shape helped to hold the soda's pressure. This bottle was from an Orchard Street privy dig, with a manufacturing date range from around the mid-1830's.



A Baltimore stoneware beer bottle - marked "IB", but most likely meant to be "JB" for John Boyd - circa 1820's to 1830's. These bottles had a substantial 5 cent refund.

# EARLY BALTIMORE BEERS & SODAS

This tapered-lip, green glass, torpedo mineral water bottle is from a Chapman competitor - "Randall & Co." circa 1844.



A beautiful example of a J. Boyd & Son (Robert) green glass bottle, which was likely manufactured in Philadelphia. There were four different molds for this style of bottle, circa 1842 to 1844.



One of Baltimore's earliest glass beer bottles - circa 1842 to 1844 - from William Coughlan, who was in business into the 1880's.



A rare, embossed, golden amber, hand-blown, cork-stoppered "TJ. Sutton's Mineral Water" with applied top. This bottle was made in three different colors. Thomas was a restaurant and saloon proprietor.

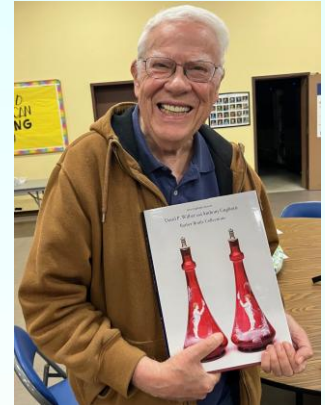

# BOTTLE BRAIN

## Question:

**What are some of the reasons Baltimore is famous for Glass and Bottles?**

## Answer:

Baltimore Glass Works was one of the most important early American glass manufacturers and helped make Baltimore a major center for glass production during the 19th century.

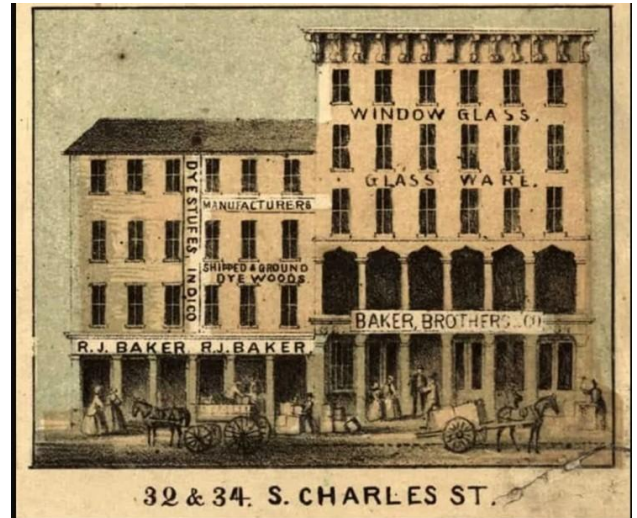
The company began around 1799–1800 in the Federal Hill area of Baltimore. It was founded by Frederick M. Amelung & Co., linked to German-born glassmaker John Frederick Amelung, who had previously operated the New Bremen Glass Manufactory in Frederick County, Maryland. The factory was also known as the Federal Hill Glass Works, Patapsco River Glass House, and Hughes Street Works.

Early production focused on: Bottles, Window glass, Glassware and Decorative blown glass.

By the 1820s–1850s, Baltimore Glass Works became especially known for its “pictorial flasks” — decorative bottles featuring patriotic imagery, monuments, corn motifs, eagles, and other embossed designs. They are also known for the many varied colors of their glass.

In the 1830s, the operation came under the control of the Baker Brothers, becoming closely associated with Baker Bros. & Co. The company expanded production and eventually shifted much activity to the Spring Garden Glass Works near what is now the Camden Yards/M&T Bank Stadium area.

During the 19th century, glassmaking became one of Baltimore’s largest industries. Entire neighborhoods around Federal Hill were nicknamed “Glass House Row” or “Glass Hill” because so many glassworkers lived there. Baltimore factories produced bottles, stained glass, mirrors, and window glass for markets across the country.





# BOTTLE BRAIN

## (continued)

The Baltimore glass industry later became associated with the famous cobalt-blue Bromo-Seltzer bottles and other regional manufacturers such as:



- Maryland Glass Corporation — best known for producing the iconic cobalt-blue bottles for Bromo-Seltzer and other products. Their “M inside a circle” maker’s mark appears on many collectible bottles.
- Carr-Lowrey Glass Company — founded in 1889 in Westport, specializing in prescription, perfume, beer, soda, and specialty bottles. They stayed in operation until 2003.
- Crown Cork & Seal Company — not a bottle maker itself at first, but hugely important to bottle history because William Painter invented the crown cap in Baltimore in 1892
- Baltimore Flint Glass Works
- Buck Glass Company



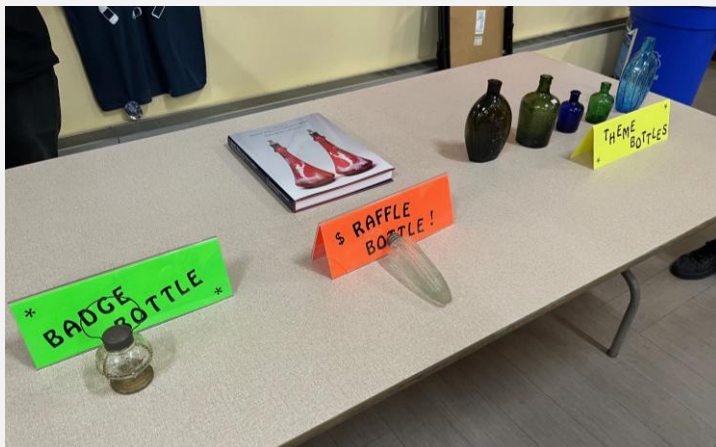

# THINK THEME BOTTLES – THIS DAY IN HISTORY

HISTORICAL EVENTS IN JUNE BY DAY (<http://holidayinsights.com/history>)

**June 1** Anne Boylen is crowned Queen of England. (1533) Captain James Lawrence, U.S. Chesapeake, makes a now famous statement: “Don’t give up the ship!” . (1813) Snow falls in Buffalo and Rochester, NY, Cleveland, Ohio, and other places. You read it correctly... snowfall in June. (1843) The Peace Bridge between the United States and Canada opens. (1927) Superman Comic hits store shelves for the first time. (1938) Ed Sullivan’s final show. (1971)

**June 2** Salem Witch Trials begin. (1692) PT Barnum’s circus begins its first tour of the U.S. (1835) Grover Cleveland marries Frances Folsom in the White House Blue Room while serving as U.S. president. (1886) Congress grants U.S. citizenship to people of American Indian descent. (1924) Ken Jennings begins his 74-day winning streak on the television game show Jeopardy. (2004)

**June 3** Hernando de Soto claims Florida for Spain. (1537) The Rolling Stones begin their first US tour. (1964) The last episode of the original Star Trek television series airs on NBC. (1969) Tiananmen Massacre, Chinese troops shoot pro-democracy protestors. (1989)

**June 4** China becomes the first to record a solar eclipse. (780 B.C.) Roquefort cheese is first made in a cave in Roquefort, France. (1070) WWII Battle of Midway begins. It lasts from June 4 to 7. (1942) D on Wetzell, Tom Barnes, and George Chastain receive a patent for the ATM machine. (1973) After winning 122 straight races, hurdler Edwin Moses’ winning streak is broken. (1987)

**June 5** Harriet Beecher Stowe publishes “Uncle Tom’s Cabin”. (1861) Bobby Kennedy is assassinated. (1968)

**June 6** The first YMCA opens in London, England. (1844) Chrysler Corporation is founded. (1925) The first drive-in theater opens in Camden, New Jersey. (1933) WWII D-Day. Allied forces successfully land in Normandy, France. (1944) Henry Morgan is the first to take his shirt off on television. (1946) “Sex and the City” television show premieres. (1998)

**June 7** The United Colonies makes a name change and becomes The United States. (1775) George T. Sampson of Dayton Ohio patents the first clothes dryer, using a rack and heat from a stove. (1892) Mahatma Gandhi performs his first of many acts of civil disobedience. (1893) U.S. Army tests the first use of a machine gun mounted on an airplane. (1922)

**June 8** Attila the Hun invades Italy. (452) Congress approves the penny postcard. (1872) Bing Crosby records “Silent Night”. (1942) “The Milton Berle Show” premieres on NBC TV. (1948) NFL and AFL announce plan to become NFC and AFC in one league, beginning in 1970. (1966)

**June 9** China leases Hong Kong to the United Kingdom for 99 years. (1898) Brinks unveils the first armored security van. (1898) Robert Goddard patents the first rocket-powered airplane. (1931) Donald Duck debuts on Disney. (1934)

**June 10** Dutch colonists settle on Manhattan Island. (1610) Bridget Bishop is the first woman convicted and hung at the Salem witch trials. (1692) Benjamin Franklin flies a kite in a lightning storm and discovers electricity. (1752) John Dillinger robs his first bank in New Carlisle, OH. He stole \$10,600. (1933) Alcoholics Anonymous was founded. (1935) In Argentina, Laslo and Georg Biro file a patent for the ballpoint pen. (1943) NASA launches the Spirit Rover, beginning the Mars Exploration Rover program. (2003)

**June 11** Greek King Agamemnon sacked and burned Troy. Estimated date 1184 B.C. Benjamin Franklin invents the Franklin stove. (1742) The movie E.T. The Extra-Terrestrial premieres in theaters. (1982) The talent show “American Idol” premieres on FOX television channel. It moved to ABC in 2018. (2002)

**June 12** John Lee Richmond pitches baseball’s first “Perfect Game”. (1880) The federal government indicts Al Capone on 5,000 counts of prohibition and perjury. (1931) The Baseball Hall of Fame is dedicated in Cooperstown, NY. (1939) Anne Frank receives a diary as a birthday present. (1942) Sonny & Cher make their first television appearance on American Bandstand. (1965) U.S. President Ronald Reagan challenges Russian President Mikhail Gorbachev to tear down the Berlin Wall. (1987)

**June 13** The first roller coaster ride opens at Coney Island in Brooklyn, NY. It costs 5 cents a ride. (1884) The U.S. Congress creates the U.S. Department of Labor. (1884) Pioneer 10 becomes the first satellite to leave the solar system. (1983)

**June 14** The U. S. Army is formed. (1775) Isaac Fischer Jr. patents sandpaper. (1834) Thomas J. Watson renames the Computer Tabulating Recording Company (CTR) to International Business Machines Company (IBM). (1924) Benjamin Grushkin patents Chlorophyll. (1938) President Richard M. Nixon installs a tape-recording system in the White House. (1971) The original movie version of "Dracula", starring Bela Lugosi, is released. (1975) JP Morgan becomes the first bank to create its own cryptocurrency. (2017)

**June 15** King John of England places the royal seal (signs) on the Magna Carta. (1215) George Washington becomes the Commander-in-Chief of the U.S. Army. (1775) Morris and Rose Michtom make the first Teddy Bear. (1903) Adolph Hitler announces the construction of the Volkswagen Beetle. (1936) Walt Disney's "Cinderella" premieres in theaters. (1950) Leon Spinks defeats Muhammad Ali in 15 rounds for the World Heavyweight title. (1976) The Cleveland Browns fire Head Coach Bill Belichick. His record in Cleveland: 36-44. (1996)

**June 16** Pope Gregory the Great issues a decree saying "God Bless You" is the proper response to a sneeze. (600) The first issue of "Ladies Home Journal" arrives on store shelves. (1883) Fidel Castro overthrows Fulgencio Batista and becomes the 16th Prime Minister of Cuba. (1959) The premiere of Ghostbusters II. (1959)

**June 17** The Battle of Bunker Hill took place, one of the first battles of the Revolutionary War. "Don't fire until you see the whites of their eyes." (1775) Charles Goodyear receives his first rubber patent. (1837) The Statue of Liberty arrives in New York City. (1885) U.S. Supreme Court rules against Bible reading and prayer in public schools. (1963) Accused of murdering his wife, police chase O.J. Simpson in his Ford Bronco for 1 1/2 hours as Americans watch live on national television. (1994)

**June 18** The three-century Tang Dynasty rule begins in China with the coronation of Li Yuan as Emperor of Gaozu. (618) William Penn founds Philadelphia. (1682) The War of 1812 begins as the United States declares war with Britain. (1812) Utica, New York is the site of the first American fly-casting tournament. (1861) Police arrest women's rights advocate Susan B. Anthony for voting in Rochester, N.Y. She is fined \$100. (1873) Sally Ride becomes the first woman in space. (1983)

**June 19** The Federal Communications Commission is created. (1934) After an 83-day filibuster, the Civil Rights Act of 1964 is approved. (1964)

**June 20** The U.S. Congress approves the Great Seal of the United States and the bald eagle as its symbol. (1782) Samuel Morse patents the telegraph. (1840) President Andrew Johnson announces the Alaska purchase from the Russian Empire. The price tag: \$7.2m. (1867) The first successful test of a rocket plane using liquid propellants. (1939) Muhammad Ali is convicted of refusing induction into the armed services. (1967) The movie "Jaws" was released. (1975) Lighthouse Day. Daily June Holidays.

**June 21** Dr. John Archer from the College of Philadelphia receives the first medical diploma in America. (1768) The U.S. Constitution goes into effect as New Hampshire becomes the 9th state to ratify it. (1788) Cyrus McCormick patents the reaping machine. (1834) The first Ferris Wheel is introduced at the Chicago Columbian Exposition. (1893) 33 1/3RPM LP record format is introduced. It is planned to replace the 78RPM format. (1948) Cleveland's Cuyahoga River catches fire due to pollution. (1969) Florida passes a law that prohibits wearing thong bathing suits. (1990)

**June 22** Hanson Gregory creates the first Doughnut. (1847) The U.S. Congress creates the Department of Justice. (1870) The game of lawn tennis is created. (1874) Authorities name John Dillinger America's first Public Enemy Number One. (1934)

**June 23** US government forms the Secret Service to protect the president. (1860) Frederick Douglas is the first African American nominated for U.S. Vice President. He received one vote at the Republican convention. (1888) Contraceptive pills are sold for the first time. (1967) The longest game in professional baseball is completed. Pawtucket Red Sox beat Rochester Red Wings 3-2 in 33 innings (game began 18th April) (1981) Brexit: The United Kingdom votes to leave the European Union. (2016)

**June 24** Henry VII is crowned the King of England. (1509) A 450-ton meteor crashed in Chicora, PA. north of Pittsburgh. The only casualty was one cow.... RIP. (1938) The deadline to convert silver certificate dollar bills into silver bullion. (1968) The Orlando Magic takes LSU Center Shaquille O'Neal with the first pick of the NBA draft. (1992)

**June 25** Governor John Winthrop of Massachusetts introduced the fork to American dining. At first, its use was considered sacrilegious. (1630) Custer's Last Stand: Lt Colonel George Custer and the 7th Cavalry are wiped out by Sioux and Cheyenne Indians at the Battle of Little Big Horn. (1876) President Herbert Hoover authorizes the construction of the Boulder Dam. It was later renamed the Hoover Dam. (1929) Major General Dwight D. Eisenhower becomes commander of U.S. forces in Europe during WWII. (1942) The Beatles release their hit song All You Need is Love. (1967) Prince releases his album "Purple Rain". (1984)

**June 26** The toothbrush is invented in China. (1498) The soap opera "The Guiding Light" moves from radio and premieres on television. It runs until 2009. (1952) The Saint Lawrence Seaway opens to shipping traffic. (1959) The Bar Code, or Universal Product Code, is introduced. (1974) The U.S. returns Iwo Jima to Japan. (1976) The CN tower in Toronto, Canada opens. (1976)

**June 27** The song "Happy Birthday to You" was first sung. Also, see Famous Birthdays. (1859) The Federal Savings and Loan Association is created. (1934) President Harry S. Truman orders U.S. Forces to South Korea to defend against invading North Korean forces. (1950) Atari Inc. created. (1972) The U.S. creates the "Do Not Call" registry to combat unwanted telemarketing calls. (2003)

**June 28** The final draft of the U.S. Constitution submitted to the Continental Congress. (1776) Colonel Robert Gibbon eats a tomato on the step of the courthouse in Salem, MA. proving that they are not poisonous. (1820) Labor Day becomes an official holiday for federal employees. (1894) Austria's Archduke Ferdinand and his wife Sophie are assassinated by a Bosnian Serb, leading to the start of WWI. (1914) Warring nations sign the Treaty of Versailles ending WW I. (1919) In the third round of a heavyweight boxing match, Mike Tyson bites Evander Holyfield's ear. Tyson was disqualified from the match and later suspended from boxing. (1977) The bald eagle was removed from the endangered species list. (2007) Professor Stephen Hawking hosts a 'party for time travelers' at the University of Cambridge. Invitations are not sent out until after the party. (2009)

**June 29** Shakespeare's Globe Theater burns down. (1613) The Civil Rights Act of 1964 is passed after an 83-day filibuster in the U.S. Senate. (1964) Financier Bernie Madoff is sentenced to 150 years in US maximum prison, for conducting a massive Ponzi scheme. (2009)

**June 30** French acrobat Blondin crosses over Niagara Falls on a tightrope. (1859) A giant fireball, most likely from an air burst of a large meteoroid or comet flattens 80 million trees near the Stony Tunguska River in Yeniseysk Governorate, Russia. (1908)

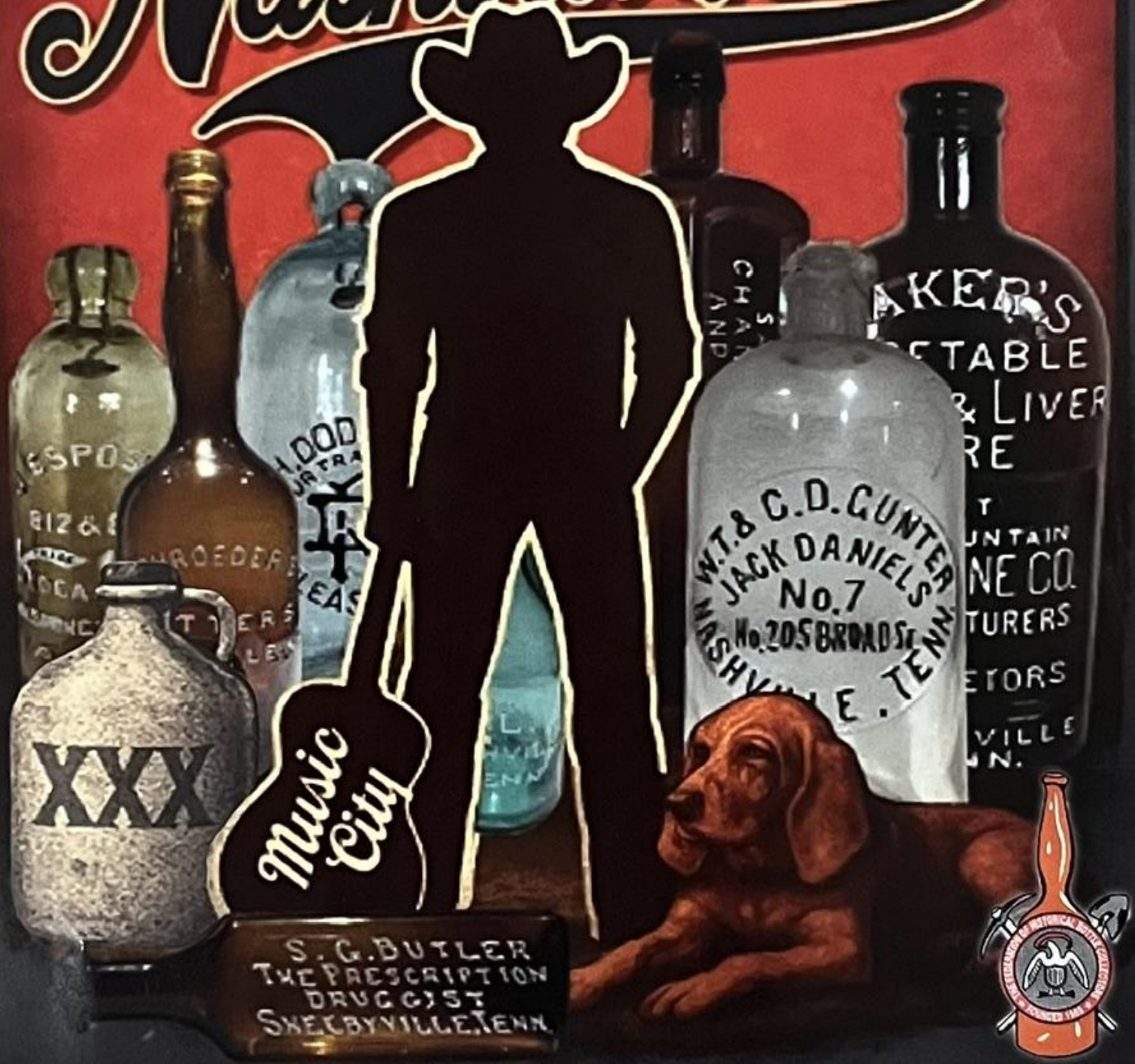
